# Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:

The Vision of National Education Policy, to provide high quality education to develop human resources in our nation as global citizens, will be well taken by Arts College, Sihora. The key principles of NEP such

	as diversity for all curriculum and pedagogy with innovative ideas in teaching and learning will be initiated and fit the learners for encouraging logical decision making and innovation, critical thinking and creativity. The Institute is affiliated to Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University where in Academic programmes are redesigned to include Interdisciplinary courses as electives and institute started offering these electives to students. In order to provide the holistic academic growth among students, Inter-disciplinary curriculum has been proposed which gives freedom to the student to choose their preferred options from the range of program offered by the institution. All the courses offered by institute are Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) till A.Y. 2023-24. Now students will complete the curriculum under NEP-2020 from this 2024-25 session onwards. College offers 10 subjects for B.A. course which enabled us to offer wide range of subject combinations in view of Interdisciplinary curriculum designing. Students of B.A. have been offered Marathi, English, Marathi Literature, English Literature, Economics, Political Science, Sociology, History, Geography and Home-Economics. For this college teaching time table has been prepared in order to allow students to attend classes of the preferred minor subject with the students of different major stream. Every year the college organizes various curricular and extra-curricular activities under NSS, Department of Cultural and Competitive Exam cell. It aims to develop three types of competencies: • The basic purpose of education and prepare them to work for the betterment of society. • Practical application of theoretical knowledge of the subject and decision- making. • Enabling them to learn and adapt through self-reflection, apply knowledge appropriately and responsibly to lead a better life.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	The Academic Bank of Credits facility introduced by the Government of India in NEP 2020 will digitally store the academic credits earned by the students of various higher education institutes across the country. Academic Bank of Credits id created by students' will enable their academic credit calculated on the basis of their class response, assignments, internal and external assessment to be stored online. It is just

account holders to whom, the ABC shall provide a

variety of services including credit verification, credit accumulation, credit transfer/redemption and Degree authentication. It aims to fulfil the students' inquisitiveness for knowledge and education by providing a system where students can choose their own learning path to attain Certificate / Diploma / Degree etc., working on the principle of multiple entry and exit as well as at anytime, anywhere, and any at any level of learning. Our institute is affiliated to Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University, Nagpur and as per the guidelines of NEP 2020 and university; registration in Academic Bank of Credits is an important mandate under National Education Policy for Ministry of Education, Government of India and State Government of Maharashtra. The State Government of Maharashtra has also recognized ABC as a foundation for implementation of multi-disciplinary/ Interdisciplinary Education, enabling an ecosystem which offers more flexible career choices to students. College has been informed by the university about the necessary action regarding an implementation of ABC. We have a dedicated team of faculty members, entrusted with the responsibility of implementation of NEP who from time to time attends workshops and training programs organized by the affiliating University, UGC and Higher Education Dept. and Government of Maharashtra With their guidance and support, class teachers have not only made students of all the years enrolled in various programs aware of the importance of ABC and its registration process but also extended all the support for opening accounts in Digilocker and ABC to understand the provisions of NEP so that same can be communicated and explained to the students and teachers for making implementation process simple and effective. Proper technical support system for monitoring ABC is created. In an increasingly dynamic environment, we strive to develop the new generation students to live purposeful life with positivity and confidence. To

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3. Skill development:

	Distinguished Guest-Speakers are invited from different walks of profession to deliver the lectures so as to keep the faculty and staff updated about world arena in different fields. The college organises various activities for the development of life skills, values etc. For the proper implementation of New Education Policy more vocational courses in collaboration with industry and corporate sector will be introduced in the upcoming days in the College.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	Our institution offers education in mother tongue i.e. Marathi. All courses / subjects are taught in Marathi medium. The other languages like English and English Literature are taught using bilingual / trilingual methods so that the students of rural areas can comprehend and develop various skills of language. The Department of Physical Education organised events focussed on Yoga. The Department of Home-Economics conducted classes on different Traditional Indian Dishes. As a part of the preservation and popularisation of Marathi language, (1) Rajbhasha Marathi Gaurav Din, (2) Essay Competition, (3) Poster Competition, (4) Poetry Recitation, (5) Group Discussion was celebrated by the Department of Marathi. In order to promote the local language and culture, it is the regular practice at institute that all NSS activities conducted in village, nearby schools are compulsory executed in local Marathi language. The college celebrates Annual Function where all the teachers and students participate in the cultural events. Our college magazine, "Sunanda" are also published in Marathi language where the students can focus their creative works as well as their views in their own languages. As most of our students are from rural areas, so they are given freedom to share their thoughts and ideas in their own language.
5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	The college works on different fronts to achieve the different parameters of Outcome Based Education. In addition to the committed teaching to develop deep knowledge of respective disciplines, various activities were conducted to update knowledge and develop their critical thinking. Assignments, discussion, question-answer session helped in identifying the Course Outcomes of the students. The code of conduct for students and staff inculcates professional and workplace ethics. Various programmes conducted by the college in association

	with Government and Non-Government agencies included a long way in inculcating constitutional, community and societal responsibilities among the students.
6. Distance education/online education:	Since it was Covid-19 pandemic time, most of the classes were conducted online. The teachers conducted their classes using different online platforms such as Google Meet/Classroom, Zoom etc. The teachers send e-content to students through What's App Groups. Many staff members upgraded their skills by attending different online Faculty Development Programmes conducted by different Teaching-Learning Centres/ Academic Staff Colleges.

The ELC is functional which has been carrying out activities in and out of the college campus that help to bring about voters awareness. The membership of this club includes teachers and students of this college.

# **1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation**

## 1.1.1

The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

#### **Response:**

The college is affiliated to the Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University, Nagpur. The curriculum for B.A. course has been restricted by the affiliating university. The curriculum design by the affiliating university and made available to the college for implementation this institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well-planned and documented including academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal assessment process as follows:

- The college follows the academic calendar issued by the affiliating university for effective implementation of the curriculum.
- In the beginning of each academic session a meeting is convened by the principal discusses the effective implementation of the curriculum. An academic calendar for the college is prepared as per the academic calendar prescribed by the university. A time table is prepared as per the norms to distributor the entire work load among the teacher for the whole year.
- The college discusses and plans an academic road map for each academic session in the annual staff meeting held at the end of the previous session i.e. in April.
- The time table committee frames annual and departmental time table so that each subject gates specified number of period as per the guideline of university.
- The college organizer various co-curricular and extra-curricular activities and adopts innovative teaching methods like discussion, debates, field-trips, seminars. Use of ICT tools etc. for the effective implementation of the curriculum.
- The college has made wi-fi and internal facility available to the faculty members. College procures text-book, reference book, journal and subject related learning material to update the learning resources for teachers and students.
- All the teacher prepare notes for distribution to the students. Teacher conduct group discusses, give assignments to the students for evaluating the knowledge and academic competence of the students.
- Educational tours are organized by various departments to provide the practical knowledge to the students.
- Most of the departments organized guest lectures in order to make the teaching learning studentsfriendly and effective, various audio-visual aids are used in the classroom.
- Extra classes are conducted if needed in order to compensate the working hours last due to various reasons beyond our control.
- At the end of the session, teacher submit Performance Based Appraisal Form (PBAS) for the scrutiny by the Principal.

#### **Response:**

Continuous Internal Evaluation system for evaluating the academic performance of the students is done by referring guidelines given by R. T. M. Nagpur University, Nagpur. Out of the 100 Marks per course, the institute level assessment marks are awarded out of 20 Marks and end semester examination is conducted for 80 Marks by the university.

For determining the institute level 20 marks assessment, continuous internal evaluation is varied from course to course. Some course gives emphasis on assignment and viva-voce and some on test also conducted along with short project work activities etc.

Institution adopts internal assessment system prescribed by Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University, Nagpur for the evaluation of the students.

#### At Institute Level:

Each department also meets on regular basis to discuss the issues concerning classroom teaching, internal assessment of students, etc. in order to create a healthy teaching-learning environment.

#### At University Level:

Students can express grievances by applying for the following evaluation procedure:

**Exam Form Filling and Correction if Need:** According to the guideline of the University, the students are informed to fill examination forms within a time. The concerned person submits online the students' information to the University. The university then provides check list to the institution. The concerned person looks into the list and checks name, subject, class, and date of birth of the students. He corrects the information and submits that check list to the University.

**Re-valuation & Recounting:** If student are not satisfied with the marks awarded, they can apply for recounting within a week from the declaration of result through the office at the institute. The received grievances are submitted to university by the institute along with prescribed fees recovered from the students. The university declares time frame every year for submission of marks related grievances and declaration of results.

The college has a well-developed library equipped with Integrated Library Management System that is **Library Technology Customize Software (Lib Tech)** has a good collection of books both for courses run in the college and for competitive examinations besides subscription to standard journals and newspapers in Marathi and English. It also has provision for separate reading sections for students, reference and digital section for accessing e-books, e-journals and online open source books. Library is open for users from 09.00 AM to 04.00 PM. Total number of books in the library are more than **2200** The college also has membership of e-journal centre to provide unlimited e-resources to our students and teachers.

The library provides following facilities and services:-

**Easy circulation**: There is a set method of issuing books to students, staff and other users. A special issue register is maintained by the attendant under the guidance of librarian. Taking the number of copies of particular book available and its demand, priority is given to the one who demanded it first.

**Issue return period**: The students are given a 7 day issue retaining period normally which can be extended for another 7 days by renewing it. There is no such time limit for staff members.

**Reading section facility**: There are separate reading sections for students and staff in the library besides a newspaper reading section which is common to both.

**Digital Section**: The library also houses a computer lab wherein 1 computer are kept for students' use exclusively. The librarian monitors the computer lab.

**OPAC**: Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) allows users to browse a book by author, title, publisher or any keyword.

Subscription to e-resources and Journal: Now-a-days e-library is very effective way for reaching to maximum number of students and the college has taken necessary steps to carry out the same. The college has also subscribed online journals and e-books for students and teachers. Students also get the opportunity to access online study materials from the Directory to Open Access Journal and online Reservoir Thesis (Sodhganga) whose links have been given on college website.

#### 6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

#### 6.1.1

The institutional governance and leadership are in accordance with the vision and mission of the Institution and it is visible in various institutional practices such as NEP implementation, sustained institutional growth, decentralization, participation in the institutional governance and in their short term and long term Institutional Perspective Plan.

#### **Response:**

The college has been giving quality education to students coming mostly from poor socio-economic background. The Late Tulsabai Bahuuddeshiy Sanstha, Tumsar is apex body in the organizational structure of the institution. It works in tandem with the Principal to regulate and maintain an amicable and scholastic environment required for the purpose of education. The Principal as the academic and administrative head of the institution implements the decisions and policies of the Management, the University and the State Government with the help of teaching and non-teaching staff. The Principal ensures proper implementation of the development plan. If any difficulty in execution of plans arises, the Governing Body's help is sought in overcoming it.

- To impart value-based quality education.
- To provide education for both social and personal transformation.

The curriculum according to New Education Policy (NEP 2020) has been adopted and implemented under the guidelines of Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University, Nagpur. Existing 1st Semester has been going on as per the same guide lines.

The college works on the principles of teamwork, collective responsibility and participatory management. For various aspects of the daily work of the college, there are committees and subcommittees to look after the work. There are similar mechanisms for overall coordination and monitoring.

In case of academic matters, the heads of various departments are involved. For administrative matters, the Principal and Head Clerk together with the coordinators are involved. For financial matters the Principal and various committees hold the responsibility of management and monitoring. In all these

#### **Response:**

The Late Tulsabai Bahuuddeshiy Sanstha, Tumsar is at the top most tier in the organizational structure of the institution. It supervises the overall functioning of the institute and directs the Principal whenever necessary.

Then there is the College Development Committee (CDC) constituted as per the norms laid down by the Maharashtra Public Universities Act, 2016 (which was earlier known as Local Managing Committee). Preparing budget and financial statements, recommending creation of teaching and nonteaching posts to the Management, discussing academic and other progress of the college are the primary functions of the CDC. The institutional decisions are made by the Principal in the consultation with management. Faculty and various committee/cell in-charges are directed by Principal.

The institute has constituted committees as per the norms of regulating authorities and also additional

committees for internal coordination and monitoring of the activities. The Principal monitors functioning of every committee. Smooth conduct of all the committees is ensured by him. Various institute and department level committees are constituted to take discuss issues and take decision up to their scope.

#### Service Rules, Procedures, Recruitment & Promotional Policy:-

Our Institute is affiliated to the RTMNU, Nagpur and is governed as per the norms laid down by the UGC and the Maharashtra Universities Act. 2016. Our College is affiliated to RTMNU, Nagpur at UG level. So, it is mandatory for the institution to observe and follow the rules of the RTM Nagpur University.

The institute strictly follows the statutory norms and procedures in recruitment and promotion of academic and administrative staff. The recruitment and promotional policies are designed by the UGC and Government of Maharashtra, and it is binding for the college to abide by them. For recruitment the institution gives advertisement in at least one national level newspaper and one local newspaper. Interviews of eligible candidates are conducted by the duly constituted selection committees after due date of submitting applications notified in the advertisement is over. Selection of the candidate is done purely on merit basis. Similarly, the existing norms are followed at the time of granting promotion to employees.

The institute has a grievance redressal mechanism in place for the students at its own level whereas RTM Nagpur University has a Grievance Committee which looks after the grievances of the employees of colleges affiliated to it.
